FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Online Child Sexual Exploitation (OCSE) impacted 160,000 children in Cambodia according to a UNICEF survey in 2022. These results are mirrored by what we learnt from surveying more than 400 children and parents earlier this year. Shockingly, we found that over 38% of girls had come across child sexual abuse materials, with live streaming being the most common media. I have a daughter and I can't bear to think of the trauma and damage that OCSE can cause. Cambodian parents are struggling to protect their children - less than 3% of parents we surveyed had talked to their children about phone safety settings and 0% of parents had ensured their children applied parental controls on their apps. Likewise 0% of parents knew how to report OCSE to local authorities. When I hear about a young girl who has been tricked into sharing sexually explicit photos or videos, who is petrified, traumatised and ready to do anything to stop those images being shared, to do anything to avoid the shame, then my heart breaks and I get angry. Those aren't healthy emotions, there is a better way join AusCam in creating hope in a safer future.

We look into the abyss, pull out girls who are victims of exploitation and engage with those who are at risk but that rehabilitation is only the dark start to a wonderful, redemptive story. We also build up the resilience and protection that is within girls and young women, walking with them to counsel, support their needs, keep them in school, get them to university, place them in jobs and develop their life and leadership skills. We don't stop there - we equip and inspire them to be the leaders, everyday heroes and Change Agents who are actively multiplying the awareness and the changed behaviour that protects and prevents the tragedy of OCSE. Please read on, and through real stories, learn about the impact, the safety and the hope we bring to Cambodia through your generous support. You will read about the journey from victim to survivor, on to resilient young woman and then hero - we invite you to join us on this journey.

HER JOURNEY FROM VICTIM TO SURVIVOR

Thida (not her real name) is a 14-year-old girl, in a traditional, conservative Cambodian family. Her parents watch over her and her curfew is before dinner... but, like almost all Cambodian parents, they don't know how to use parental controls on online devices and discussions about personal issues can be challenging.

Thida met a boy online. He was from Phnom Penh. He called her on video everyday and brought her online phone cards. Thida loved the attention and thought she was in love - do you remember how that first love turned your life upside down?

Then he asked her to send him naked photos in secret, just for him. Next, it was naked videos...and as things escalated, she became scared. She tried to break up with him, and then the threats started. "Send more or I will share the photos with your family and friends". From this point, it became worse as he began placing time limits on her - 15 minutes to post a new naked photo or he would post her photos publicly.

Thida became increasingly scared and in desperation she called our hotline. Our counselor was there, firstly to calm and reassure her, then to support her on the road to recovery. Through our protection partnership with Meta, we were able to have all sexualised images removed from social media and the perpetrator was removed and banned from all social media sites. We ensured Thida had access to legal advice and our social workers supported her to talk to her parents. We were there every step of the way to work through and beyond the trauma.

This is the journey from victim to survivor





Sokkha, (not her real name) was living with her grandmother, in poverty, in Phnom Penh. We were supporting her with an education scholarship to ensure she could remain in school. Then, sadly her grandmother passed away. We were able to support Sokkha by attending her grandmothers funeral, provided counselling for her grief, helped her to relocate to her cousin's home, and provided emergency support for the family. Today, Sokha is thriving as she adjusts to her new family and commits to her studies with hope for the future.

We are currently supporting many more young women with education (school & university) scholarships and job placements, who also attend our girls clubs and life skills training. In hundreds of lives, we are actively building the resilience that prevents trafficking and exploitation.

HER JOURNEY - EVERYDAY HEROES MULTIPLYING CHANGE

Seila (not her real name) shows us where the journey becomes full of hope and truly empowering. She is 17, a high school student, and has been a part of a girls club we facilitate. Earlier this year, she joined our training on running campaigns. Following this training, Seila formed a group, "GSO", Girls for Safety Online. The group identified their priority messages and strategies, they created a Facebook page and an online campaign. Three months later, they have held live events at their school, have posted 2-3 times a week on Facebook, created posters, quizzes, several videos and have a reach and engagement that connects to about 5000, mostly their peers who so desperately need to know about online safety. They have presented their model to a group of about 90 girls who are university scholarship recipients, 100 youth in another trafficking prevention NGO, and they are actively recruiting others to join AusCam's Sisterhood of Change Agents.

Seila talks of her growth, her vision of new leadership experiences and how more girls need to learn how to stay safe online. She is a Change Agent, a leader, an everyday hero - and every time she shares that message of hope, safety and citizenship she is also building that script into her own identity, and becoming an inspiration for others too.




HOW WE WORK

We come alongside girls who are victims of, or at risk of, trafficking or exploitation and walk with them until they are stable and safe. This is our first impact.

Those girls and young women are supported on a journey - we equip them to become everyday heroes and Agents of Change - in the process they grow in identity, leadership and life skills. The science is clear that this creates the resilience that lasts a lifetime. This is our second impact

As they reach out to their peers through campaigns, citizenship research and being peer mentors, they then reach thousands more of their peers - teenagers who can speak to the heart and to the hopes of other teenagers, to make real change. This is our third impact that ripples across Cambodia.





This triple impact takes a girl from being a victim to being a survivor, who becomes resilient and takes on a positive identity as a hero, within a Sisterhood of Change Agents, all of which keeps Cambodia safe and protected. Our role within her journey is to be there, to walk alongside, build capacity, help her to connect to a hopeful, positive community and to grow in her confidence and creativity as she reaches out and beyond her own trauma, to be a protector of others




